
SCOUT POST CARDS - THE HUMOROUS SIDE

Scouting was founded in England in 1907. Scout post cards started appearing almost immediately. Most of these depict leaders, camp scenes, and activities such as camping, games, knot tying, first aid, etc.

Scouts quickly became known for doing good turns, being good citizens, performing Scout activities, etc. and for their distinctive uniform and sharp appearance. But not everyone took the Scouts as seriously as some of their leaders did. Post cards with a sense of humor and poking fun at the Scouts soon came on the scene.

This is a "fun" exhibit displaying examples of the various post cards that appeared. Shown are selected early English post cards showing their subtle sense of humor, a cute US "good deed" post card, a variety of colorful post cards from Belgium and Czechoslovakia, US Boy and Girl Scout camp post cards, and even a couple of "naughty" post cards – one US and one French.

The English published a number of post cards titled the "Scout" Series about 1914-1915. Many of these cards had fun with the boy/girl theme.



Typically, most boys of this age would rather be doing outdoor activities instead of spending time with girls.




"COLD STEEL"




It looks like a little "angel" has two young Scouts all stirred up.




Part of USA Kid Comics series. Making fun of what a Scout has to do to perform his daily Good Turn or "Good Deed."

About 1950, a large number of colorful, comic Boy Scout post cards were published in Belgium and used throughout much of Western Europe.




The "13th Scout Law" is *A Scout is Hungry*. Here, Scouts use a little ingenuity in finding food. Disaster!






Look who got caught sneaking a bite out of the hot dog.







A thinking Scout -- using gravity to get his gear down the hill.








They weren't expecting "frog legs" in this stew!

Kids love to tell about their animal stories. What great stories these Scouts will have to tell!




Of course, we can't leave out the Girl Scouts. They do funny things and get in unusual predicaments like the Boy Scouts do.

There are always pranksters in every group!




What sort of good turn can you do for me




A "naughty" French post card. Pity the poor Scout leader who has to spend time with the boys away from home.
