

It was with considerable dismay that I learned in New York at the time of the Interpex, that the Post Office Department and its Citizens Stamp Advisory Commit-tee had decided against the issu-ance of a commemorative for the World Boy Scout Jamboree in Idaho this summer. It seems that the basis of the decision was the fact that the Scouts has been memorialized previously.

This is all true. However, where the United States is host to these boys from all over the world, many of whom would delight in a souvenir of this kind because of its economy, we fail them. I refer specifically to non - stamp collectors — naturally, the philatelic-minded ones are going to be thoroughly disappointed.

It would be the first time since 1933, when Hungary was the locale of this international event, that the host nation failed to issue at least one stamp. Most times, the Scouts receive a tribute amounting to a modest priced set of two or more.



There is a ready made design which can be adopted quick-ly — the official emblem which will be worn by all. I'm sure that the officers and governing board of the Boy Scouts of America will grant permission for its use.

If the time is too short for a stamp, then it will be possible to produce a commemorative postal card, one similar to that for SIPEX with views of America, or with a Scouting theme. In any case, let's not let this outstanding affair pass without philatelic recognition from the Post Office Department — not with a special postmark or cachet - but with a stamp or postal card.

The Jamboree takes place August 1 to 9 in Idaho's Farragut State Park. Of the 17,000 boys expected, 4280 will be from the U.S.
