


Girl Scouts 1912 Grans old


On March 12, 1912, a group of girls living in Savannah, Georgia became the first Girl Scots in the United States. It happened this way; Juliette Gordon Low, aunt of one of the girls, had just returned from England where she had known Lord Baden-Powell, the founder of the Scout movement for both boys and girls, and had worked with him there as the leader of several early Girl Guide companies. This experience made her realize how much fun and benefit was packed into Scouting and she couldn't wait to bring it to the girls of her native America. Mrs. Low was both impetuous and vigorous. In a very short time she had wound up her affairs in England, sailed for the United States, and arrived in a flurry in Savannah. Befores she umpacked her trunk she was on the phone rounding up girls by saying "come on over ... I've get something for the girls of Savannah, and all America, and all the world, and we're going to start it tonight." The girls came. They heard Mrs. Low talk about Scouting and organized a troop immediately.

From that moment on Girl Scouting grew mapidly, spreading from Savannah
to other parts of the country. Totay, forty years later, there are 1,770,000

Force for Freedom."

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









