The 1918 Czechoslovak Scout Official Mail Delivery Service

Following the collapse of the Austro-Hungarian Empire at the end of World War I and the successful revolt on October 28, 1918 in Prague, the Czechoslovak National Committee of Liberation, or National Council, which was politically aligned with the Czech freedom fighter Thomas G. Masaryk, became the Provisional Government of the areas which are today the independent countries of the Czech Republic and Slovakia. Other political factions vied with the National Council for power, and security of communications within National Council operations was a paramount concern. Following the suggestion of Joseph Roessler-Orovsky, the President of the Czech Scout Association, the National Council established the Czechoslovak Official Mail Delivery Service, or Scout Post, patterned after the Cadet Bicycle Corps of the siege of Mafeking, South Africa during the Second Anglo-Boer War, which became the model for the Boy Scout movement founded by Lord Robert Baden-Powell in 1907. The Scout Post operated from November 7 through November 25, 1918, during which Czech Scouts carried letters, printed matter, telegrams, and parcels in support of National Council operations.

Two stamps, a 10 heller blue and a 20h red, both in the same design with the Czech lion, were produced by the Kollman firm in Prague. It is estimated that 30,000 of the 10h and 50,000 of the 20h were produced, in two printings: the first on heavy paper with hand-applied, uneven yellow gum; the second on thinner paper with machine-applied white gum. The stamps were relief-printed on pre-gummed paper, and the edges were simultaneously die-cut out ("died out"), approximating a 12-1/2 perforation. Only one die was prepared for each value; the dies were defaced by filing after the second printing. The 10h

was used to account for the delivery of printed matter, which was usually conveyed in unsealed envelopes with ungummed flaps; the 20h, for delivery of letters, telegrams, and parcels. This accounting was necessary because the Scout Association was paid a lump sum for the Scout Post services from a special National Council fund.

Scouts carried telegrams addressed to the National Council from the Wireless [Telegraph] Station to the National Council offices in the Hradcany Palace. Genuinely carried and marked telegrams are quite scarce. At the Wireless Station, incoming


telegrams were first folded in half horizontally, then folded again into thirds in such a manner that the top center one-sixth of the original telegram was visible from the front of the folded telegram. Then the back flaps of the folded telegram were bound together by a square paper seal which was pasted over the overlapping back flaps. Folded and sealed telegrams were then collected in bundles for pick-up by Scouts; the bundles may have been held together by string or twine. Scouts delivered the bundles of telegrams to the Scout Post operations center collocated with the Na-

tional Council offices in the Hradcany Palace. There, before the bundle of telegrams was broken open, an adult Scout leader applied Scout Post stamp(s) to the telegram on the top of each bundle, tied the stamp(s) with a POSTA SKAUTU [Scout Post] or NV [National Council] handstamp, applied a two-line "Dopis od skauta... prevzal..." [Delivered by Scout...received by...] handstamp and wrote in the name of the Scout who had delivered the telegrams and the date of the delivery. Since only the top telegram of each bundle was franked with Scout Post stamp(s), genuinely carried and marked telegrams are quite scarce. The illustrated telegram was genuinely carried and marked. Both the NV and "Dopis od skauta... prevzal..." handstamps are incomplete; they were interrupted by the horizontal fold of the telegram, since they were applied while the telegram was still atop its original bundle, before it was unfolded.

For communications support of Scout Post operations, 1000 post cards were produced with an embossed indicium of the 10h stamp die, also in blue. Although the unused remainder were destroyed after the Scout Post ceased operations, genuinely used examples are much scarcer than mint cards. The illustrated card authorized the Scout who carried it (Scout Nusle) to pick up telegrams at the Wireless Station. When traveling around Prague on Scout Post business, Scouts often rode on the city trolley system. Used post cards are known with handwritten instructions on the front which told the Scouts which trolleys to ride to reach delivery addresses.

For one day on December 21, 1918 the Scout Post was reactivated by direction of the National Council to

carry messages in support of the arrival in Prague of Thomas G. Masaryk, who had been elected first President of the new government of the Czech Republic. 600 10h Scout Post stamps were overprinted "Arrival of President Masaryk" in red, and 1000 20h stamps were overprinted in black, by the Knapp Printing company in Prague. The overprints were inverted on four 20h stamps; today, two of these are in the Czech Postal Museum, and two are in private hands. The overprints were primarily used on letter envelopes; a small number were added to post cards. Eight tele-



grams were carried from the Wireless Station and franked with overprints. The illustrated cover contained a communication from the National Council to J.U.Dr. J. Scheiner, the official in charge of state defense and the temporary head of state until the arrival of President Masaryk. The unused remainder of the overprints were destroyed after the Scout Post ceased operations.
